6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- Revision of curriculum to fine tune with CBCS system in PG, UG and Integrated courses
- Starting four new programmes of PG teaching in the two campuses
- Participation of alumni and industry in curriculum preparation
- Opinions were sought and obtained from different stakeholders. These were
 discussed at various levels and them taken up to the Board of studies, which
 includes members from other institutes and industries and recommended for
 approval by Academic Council.
- The university follows a systematic process in the design and development of the curriculum based on need assessment and feedback from stakeholders.
- The opinions/suggestions received from renowned academia, industrialists and scientists through their formal/informal interactions with faculty members in the seminars/ conferences/workshops on the curricula are taken into consideration while restructuring the curricula.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Admissions to TDC courses are made on the basis of marks in the qualifying examination. Sometimes, written tests and oral interviews are conducted in certain subjects. An admission committee is constituted for admission in various courses. Class tests are conducted before university Annual Examinations. Teaching plans are prepared for each course. Sometimes tutorial classes are conducted. Teachers are sent for Refresher and orientation Courses and are encouraged to conduct / participate in Seminar / Workshop on the emerging fields in the subject. The colleges also interact regularly with university departments through discussion in different academic bodies and also through personal contacts.

Examination System:

- The university introduced Semester System from the Academic year 2010-2011 in all its Under Graduate Courses and Professional courses.
- In the Post Graduate courses the Semester System was introduced since the beginning. From the academic year 2010-2011 the Choice Based Credit System and Open Course System have been introduced.
- Internal assessment has been introduced in Post Graduate and Professional Courses.
- Gradation, Credit System and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) have been introduced from 2010-11 session.

Achievements:

- 1. Computerization of result processing of all examinations.
- 2. Introduction of Semester System in Three Year Degree Courses, Professional Courses and in all Diploma Courses along with Internal Assessment.
- 3. Normally, results are published within 15 to 60 days of completion of Examination. Average time for publication of results is 45 days.
- 4. Introduction of Choice Based Credit System in Post Graduate Courses from 2010-2011.
- 5. Introduction of Gradation & Credit system and CGPA in all Courses from 2010-2011.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The University has two separate Boards of Research Studies for Science / Technology and Humanities/ Social Science, with the following composition:

Research is a significant activity of the university and efforts are made so that all faculty members are associated with Research. The faculty Members of the University have produced about 132 Books and nearly 950 research papers during the last five years. The university conducts nearly 40-50 conference/seminars annually. At present, FIST support of DST in the Department of Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Ecology & Environmental Science and Life Science is under effect. The UGC had also sanctioned SAP-DRS to the 152 Life Science, Philosophy, Bengali, Chemistry, Mathematics, Ecology & Environmental Sciences, Biotechnology, Hindi, and Physics Departments. Bio-informatics Facility (BIF) has been provided by the DBT.

In the 12th Plan, the University received an allocation of Rs. 84 Crores. Separate provision for computers, peripherals, and equipments for both teaching and research has been allocated by the University, which amounts to Rs.4 Crore for the Plan period. In addition, the faculty members as well as departments are encouraged to arrange fund or research and development through individual as well as departmental projects from different funding agencies. Currently 90 such projects are in progress with an approximate amount of Rs.3100.00 lakhs fund received in the last plan period.

The university provides basic research facilities in terms of Library, Books & Journals, Computer, Internet, Equipments, and Consumables of laboratory for research and development. The research is encouraged through Research Projects funded by different funding agencies. All full time Ph. D. and M. Phil Scholars are provided Rs 8000/- and Rs 5000/- as Scholarship respectively and Rs 10,000/- contingencies for Science and Arts students respectively. The University has established a Central Instrumentation Facility with sophisticated instruments to promote research.

Yes, more than 267 journals (114 foreign, 153 Indian) are subscribed as hard copies apart from access to over 8531 journals in electronic form through INFLIBNET. Yes. Scientists are recognized as co-guide to guide research scholars in collaboration with many national institutions of repute, and collaborative research programme have been undertaken.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

The vacant posts are advertised in National, Regional and Local newspapers. The applications received are screened as per UGC qualifications by screening committee. The staffs are recruited through duly constituted Selection Committee. After initial screening, Non-teaching staffs are selected through written test, followed by skill test (whenever required), oral interview and thereafter after recommendation of the Selection Committee on merit basis following Central Govt. rules / guidelines. For the teaching post there is a provision for oral interview

- ➤ UNIVERSITY-INDUSTRY PARTNERSHIP PROJECT (UIPP-AU) took off in Assam University in April, 2014 to serve as a platform where University Departments and the major industries in this region can engage themselves in meaningful dialogue on a continuing basis for (i) creating synergy, (ii) bridging gaps and (iii) setting for themselves new benchmarks of innovation and productivity. Twelve University Departments voluntarily enlisted themselves as constituents of UIPP-AU. Industry is represented in UIPP by officials from: (i) Hindustan Paper Corporation (HPC), (ii) Oil & Natural Gas Commission (iii) Oil India Ltd (iv) State Bank of India (v) Goodriche (vi) Assam Gramin Vikas Bank (vii) NEDFI (viii) Vodafone (ix) ICICI Bank (x) Rosekandi Tea (xi) Jayshree Tea (of Birla Group) (xii) Star Cements (xiii) Bharti Airtel (xiv) Kay Dee Cold Storage Pvt Ltd, and (xv) MSME, Silchar, among others.
- The UIPP Road Map for actualizing University-Industry Partnership on a continuing basis, that was drawn in a Colloquium organized in Assam University on 6th April, 2014, focuses on the following four important dimensions for realization of the UIPP mission:
 - O <u>Dimension- I</u>: Introduction of special academic courses and programmes to cater to industry-needs and facilitating and fostering industry-participation in curriculum-designing, and in on-and-off campus placement programmes.
 - o <u>Dimension-II:</u> includes, Management Development Programmes (MDPs), On-job training, and Short term Orientation Courses for serving managers.
 - o <u>Dimension-III:</u> includes extension of Consultancy Services by specialist University Faculty, joint organization of Seminars and Workshops; and
 - o <u>Dimension-IV</u>: includes Sponsored researches for product/process development, Sponsored surveys (including market surveys), Collaborative or Joint researches for product/process innovation.

UIPP is also to organize interactions and Meets on a regular basis so that the academia and the Industry can come closer for knowing each-other better.

- ➤ Keeping in view the current level and range of core competency of the Assam University faculty, UIPP has decided to concentrate its industry-related initiative in the '3-T's i.e. Tea, Tourism and Technology sectors. In the first year after launching, UIPP initiatives revolved around the first of the above four dimensions. Special academic courses and programmes have been designed at the initiative of the participating University Departments to cater to the needs of the local tea industry and the MSME sector. Proposals have been sent to the Govt. of India under the *Kaushal* scheme for launching of academic courses for creating capable manpower for the Hospitality and Tourism Industry, the IT, MSME and Food Processing sectors and the Construction Industry.
- ➤ UIPP has also taken an initiative for empanelling Industry-Experts who can be involved be in planning and in running of various relevant academic programmes by way of direct participation (as experts), and through extension to the University Departments their counselling and guidance. A List accordingly has been compiled which is now available in the Assam University website.
- Assam University's growing proximity to Industry has generated meanwhile positive fall-outs in the placement front. Corporate participation in the campus placement programme 2014-15 has been encouraging. The recruiters who participated in the Placement Session January-April, 2015 included, among others: AXIS Bank; Berger Paints; Wipro Technology; Taj Group of Hotels; Thyrocare Technology Limited; HDFC Bank; ICICI Prudential, UNISYS; Reliance Communication, and Abbott India.

- Research collaboration with different Research organizations and Universities
