AWARENESS CAMP ON DE-ADDICTION ORGANISED IN SILCOORI CAMP

An awareness camp on De-addiction was organised to by the Department of Social Work, Assam University, Silchar in collaboration with New life Foundation (organisation dealing with the rehabilitation of the drug addicts) on 3rd January, 2016 to spread awareness on drug de-addiction in the region.

A team of experts including the counsellors, mediation therapist, social workers, attended the camp and catered to the queries and the needs of the victims of drug addiction.

Almost 35 people including students and local people also participated in the camp to create a positive impact on the society to discourage the consumption of drugs.

The Counsellor advised the students to discuss their issue with their parents and families than seeking support from the immature peers.

He said , "Don't be shy from sharing your problems with your parents. They will have good judgment about the problem and may help you in a better way than your friends. The parents may also further help you to understand the good and the bad habits."

The camp focused on discouraging the students to consume the drugs and rather avoid the consumption right at the first stage.

A Social Work trainee at the de-addiction camp said, "The drug addiction is such a disease which spreads like a termite in the society. If you end up taking one wrong step in your life (consuming drugs), you end up doing that repeatedly. This disturbs your entire life and also affects your family.

The counsellor also said, "apart from the nuisance of terrorism, pollution a growing problem is that of drug abuse. Since past one year, our organisation is trying to work towards spreading awareness. It is seen that students have a higher risk rate of drug addiction in the valley. They are the future of the Barak Valley and the country and thus it is important to teach them that they must stay away from the drugs".

The students had appreciated the program and hoped that similar initiatives shall be taken in the future as well.

HEALTH CHECK-UP CAMP AT OLD IRONGMARA

With an aim to spread awareness about the importance of regular health screenings and ill effects of sedentary lifestyle such as smoking, alcohol consumption is very common among the people. Department of Social Work in collaboration with NSS wing of Assam University, Silchar has taken this initiative and has organized a health camp on 23rd March 2018 at Old Irongmara Community; where more than 80 people participated.

“Due to work pressure and shortage of time most of the youngsters and also adults often ignore their regular health screenings. In addition to it, smoking addiction, binging on alcohol can ruin their health in long run. To prevent future complications, frequent health screening is necessary, especially for youngsters. The prognosis can be made in a better way if the diagnosis is made early.” said one of the Doctors.

Along with the routine tests, the team of specialist also referred vaccination and doctor consultation to the people. To prevent future ailments, they were advised to adopt healthy lifestyle which includes yoga, exercise, and healthy diet.

“As the cases of lifestyle diseases such as hypertension, diabetes is rising and working professionals find it difficult to manage time for work and health simultaneously. Therefore such health check-up provides a platform for the youngsters to manage all their regular health screenings as per their convenience. Going for preventive health check-ups from a young age will raise the probabilities for a longer and healthier life in the future added one of the Social Work trainees.

In that programme the recourse persons has also highlighted that in Cachar district one stop centre deals with issues of girls below 18 years of age affected by violence irrespective of caste, creed, religion. In addition, the centre administrator has also discussed about her roles and service delivery mechanism of One Stop Centre. She has also interacted with village women and encourages them to take benefit from one stop centre in case of vulnerability faced by any women. The programme was attended by 30 participants.

CANCER AWARENESS PROGRAMME BEHIND UNIVERITY QTRNO.6



An Awareness programme was organised by Department of Social Work in collaboration with Cachar Cancer Hospital and Research Centre, Silchar. The programme was organised on 18th November, 2018 and it was well attended by 50 participants. The main motto of the programme was “A little awareness can go a long way in preventing cancer”

Cancer is a major public health concern in India and has now become one of the leading causes of death in the country. As per WHO Report 2005, the estimated cancer deaths in India are projected to increase to 7 lakh by 2015. According to World Economic Forum (WEF), cancer is among one of the three greatest risks to the global economy due to escalating cost of care, the threat to productivity from death and disability and the effects of costs on household impoverishment.

The resource person stated that “all too often, when the doctor utters the word 'cancer', what the patient hears is "you are dying". The fact is it need not be so. The fear often arises out of ignorance and misconceptions, rather than any reality”. one of the main problems in India, in the control of cancer was lack of knowledge about lifestyles and societal practices that caused 70 per cent of its occurrence.

He further stated that “The three most common fatal cancers in men are oral, stomach and lung. For women, cervical, stomach and breast are the most dangerous”.

He further stressed that Cigarette smoking and chewing pan, tobacco and guthka are the main reasons behind oral and lung cancer in men and Women. A woman over the age of 35 years giving birth to her first child doubles her risk of getting breast cancer.

One of the Social Work trainee said that “We realized that people needed to be told cancer was preventable, detectable at an early stage, and curable if treated promptly to detect early symptoms of cancer in order to treat them effectively”.

The camp covered general information about cancer, different kinds of cancer, warning signs and symptoms, known causes, risk factors, effect of lifestyle, diet and cancer correlation, dangers of tobacco abuse, cancer status in India, women’s cancers, head and neck cancers & myths.

Department of Social Work conducted an awareness program on Good Touch and Bad Touch among school students in Silcoorie Camp was organised on 30th November, 2018

. The awareness programme was conducted in collaboration with ChildLine Silchar. Following concepts were covered: –

- Our bodies are unique
- Private parts of our body
- Safe and unsafe touch
- Trusted circle
- Reinforcing the rules

During the programme, the children were very enthusiastic and interactive. They answered questions and were eager to learn. It was a workshop about how to teach the difference between ‘good touch’ and ‘bad touch’. A video on ‘Good Touch and Bad Touch’ was also played during the awareness programme. Trainers collected feedback on the workshop in the end and closed the workshop. Teachers said that they were happy to learn about ‘Good Touch and Bad Touch’ and how to approach the problem. OBSERVANCE OF WORLD CANCER DAY

An awareness programme on Cancer was organised to observe World Cancer day by Department of Social Work in collaboration with Cachar Cancer Hospital and Research Centre, Silchar. The programme was organised on 27th November, 2018 and it was well attended by 30 participants. The main motto of the programme was “A little awareness can go a long way in preventing cancer”

Cancer is a major public health concern in India and has now become one of the leading causes of death in the country. As per WHO Report 2005, the estimated cancer deaths in India are projected to increase to 7 lakh by 2015. According to World Economic Forum (WEF), cancer is among one of the three greatest risks to the global economy due to escalating cost of care, the threat to productivity from death and disability and the effects of costs on household impoverishment.

The resource person stated that “all too often, when the doctor utters the word 'cancer', what the patient hears is "you are dying". The fact is it need not be so. The fear often arises out of ignorance and misconceptions, rather than any reality”. one of the main problems in India, in the control of cancer was lack of knowledge about lifestyles and societal practices that caused 70 per cent of its occurrence.

He further stated that “The three most common fatal cancers in men are oral, stomach and lung. For women, cervical, stomach and breast are the most dangerous”.

He further stressed that Cigarette smoking and chewing pan, tobacco and guthka are the main reasons behind oral and lung cancer in men and Women. A woman over the age of 35 years giving birth to her first child doubles her risk of getting breast cancer.

One of the Social Work trainee said that “We realized that people needed to be told cancer was preventable, detectable at an early stage, and curable if treated promptly to detect early symptoms of cancer in order to treat them effectively”.

The camp covered general information about cancer, different kinds of cancer, warning signs and symptoms, known causes, risk factors, effect of lifestyle, diet and cancer correlation, dangers of tobacco abuse, cancer status in India, women’s cancers, head and neck cancers & myths.



COMMUNITY MAPPING IN SILCOORIE POST OFFICE COMMUNITY

An awareness cum meeting on PRA was held in silcoorie Post Office Community where more than 25 community people actively participated. The programme was organised on 4th February, 2019

Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA) and Participatory Learning and Action (PLA):

Participatory learning is a method of mapping and doing micro planning of any community. As far as rural development is concern, probably the PRA / PLA is being used for Social, Resource mapping and transact walk. Some the tools of PRA/ PLA have been used, i.e.

A. Social Mapping: - Social Mapping is very important tool of PRA/PLA. The faculty member has introduced about the PLA and given importance of social mapping. With the help of villagers, students and field work supervisor had decided the place for drawing the social map of village. The villagers and students have drawn the social map of village with the help of colourful chalks and rangoli. In social mapping the villagers has decided four directions of village i.e. East, West, South and North, then drawn the roads, Gram panchyat office, Anganwadi, Temples, houses, internal roads, drinking water resources, and so on. While drawing the social map the majority greater women participation was found.

B. Resource Mapping: - At the stage of planning practice, a resource mapping has carried out in Silcoorie village in order to complete information needed for providing information and services to villagers. Such a mapping explores number and services available, and provided by the social trainee students as well as individuals to meet particular need. As we know that, the rural camp is an important part and parcel of Social Work Education. For sustainable development of Silcoorie village student social work trainees and community people has conducted the participatory rural appraisal in this village. In which students has done the map of the social map and the resource map with the participation of villagers. And collected the information regarding the problems which have been faced by the villagers; on the basis of





components such as; Health, Water and irrigation, Women and children, Integrated Child Development Scheme (ICDS), Self Help Groups , Watershed, Education, Livelihood, etc.

AWARENESS PROGRAMME ON GOVERNMENT WELFARE PROGRAMMES

On 4th February 2019, an awareness programme was organized by the Department of Social Work, Assam University, Silchar in Barik Nagar Community. Beti Bachao Beti Padhao Main purpose: The goal of this scheme is to make girls socially and financially self-reliant through education. Ujala Yojna Main purpose: State run Energy Efficiency Services Ltd (EESL) has distributed over 30 crore light emitting diode (LED) bulbs across country under zero-subsidy Unnat Jyoti by Affordable LEDs for All (UJALA) scheme. Pradhan Mantri Suraksha Bima Yojana Main purpose: Pradhan Mantri Suraksha Bima Yojana is a government-backed accident insurance scheme in India. As of May 2016, only 20% of India's population has any kind of insurance, this scheme aims to increase the number etc. In that awareness and information programme, there were around fifty participants were participated. To conclude the programme ended with the feedback and take questions of the participants with the hope of the realization of the need of the people should be meet with the implementation of various government schemes.



FORMATION OF COMMUNITY VIGILANCE GROUP IN UDHARBOND GP

This was followed by a ‘Briefing’ by Student Volunteers on the rules and regulations governing Voter’s rights and giving details about the Election Process including Right to Information about candidates and Neither Of The Above (NOTA) option selection on the Electronic Voting Machine (EVM).

Volunteers also staged a Street Play (Nukkad Natak) highlighting the importance of participation in voting process on the day of elections. Street play emphasized on not to treat -election day as a holiday but it’s a day wherein everyone should go and cast their votes at their respective booths.

Volunteers also laced the day up with a skit which showcased the importance of exercising the right by individuals who are literate and involved in social causes, but still do not like to participate in giving their vote on the day of election. The skit highlighted the disadvantages of wrong candidates getting elected due to non-participation of all citizens in the election process. DOCUMENTARY FILM SHOW ON MENSTRUAL HYGIENE AND WITCH HUNTING

The Department of Social work, Assam University, Silchar has arranged a documentary Film Show on Menstrual Hygiene and Witch Hunting on 4th December, 2018. The programme was organised to make people aware that Menstruation is a normal biological process and a key sign of reproductive health. The film has shown that Menstruation or period is normal vaginal bleeding that occurs as part of the women's monthly cycle. The first period usually begins between 12-15 years of age, this phase is known as menarche. In many cultures it is treated as something negative, shameful or dirty. The continued silence about menstruation combined with limited access to information at home and in school results in millions of women and girls having very little knowledge about what happening with their bodies when they menstruate and how to deal with it. In addition to persisting taboos, women and girls' capacity to manage their periods is affected by a number of other factors, including limited access to affordable and hygienic sanitary materials and disposal option leaving many to manage their periods in effectives, uncomfortable and unhygienic ways. In addition, the movie has also shown that Witch-hunt, occult practices and superstitious beliefs are still existent in rural Assam. Black magic practitioners, called bej or ojha, still hold sway in wide swathes of tribal-dominated areas in the state. The movie has enlightened the participants about the prevalence of witch hunting which is a violation of basic human rights and a social menace. The trainees who have attended the programme have expressed satisfaction towards this initiative. Total 65 students have participated in the programmed.

An awareness cum meeting on PRA was held in Shabspur Community where more than 30 community people actively participated. The programme was organised on 4th February, 2019

Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA) and Participatory Learning and Action (PLA):

Participatory learning is a method of mapping and doing micro planning of any community. As far as rural development is concern, probably the PRA / PLA is being used for Social, Resource mapping and transact walk. Some the tools of PRA/ PLA have been used, i.e.

Social Mapping is very important tool of PRA/PLA. The faculty member has introduced about the PLA and given importance of social mapping. With the help of villagers, students and field work supervisor had decided the place for drawing the social map of village. The villagers and students have drawn the social map of village with the help of colourful chalks and rangoli. In social mapping the villagers have decided four directions of village i.e. East, West, South and North, then drawn the roads, Gram panchyat office, Anganwadi, Temples, houses, internal roads, drinking water resources, and so on. While drawing the social map the majority greater women participation was found. In addition, a resource mapping has carried out in the Shabaspur village in order to complete information needed for providing information and services to the villagers. Such a mapping explores number and types of services available, and provided by the social work trainee students as well as individuals to meet a particular need. As we know that, the rural camp is part and parcel of Social Work Education. For

sustainable development of Shabaspur village student social work trainees and community people has conducted the





participatory rural appraisal in this village. In which students has done the map of the social map and the resource map with the participation of villagers. And collected the information regarding the problems which have been faced by the villagers; on the basis of components such as; Health, Water and irrigation, Women and children, Integrated Child Development Scheme (ICDS), Self Help Groups, Watershed, Education, Livelihood, etc.
